

THE TIME HAS COME

New York City police officers make on average 30% less than officers in similar jobs in the metro area, with that disparity growing as other police officers keep getting well-deserved raises.

With a \$3.2-billion surplus — largest in the city's history — the Bloomberg administration continues to claim it can't afford to pay New York City police officers what they deserve.

The Bloomberg administration refuses to compensate for additional anti-terror police duties while New York State has agreed to pay State Troopers new expanded-duty pay for increased anti-terror duties.

New York City police officers endured 3 1/2 years with no raises during the economic boom of the 1990s because the city claimed it couldn't afford to pay.



When you combine all cash incentives, the New York State Troopers' total four-year package is valued at 5% the first year and 7% for each of the remaining three years.

New York City Police Officer is the only civil service title earning dramatically less than its counterparts in other big cities.

New York State Troopers have been granted a pay package far greater than those granted to non-police state personnel with no give-backs.

New York City wants its police officers to pay for their own raises by working extra days, giving up vacation days or reducing pay during the first 5 years.
